# VETERANS ADMNISTRATION

Record breaking VA claims production brings backlog under 200K May 22, 2025 Access to non-VA care no longer requires secondary approval

*WASHINGTON* – The Department of Veterans Affairs announced today that its disability benefits compensation claims backlog is under 200,000 for the first time since March 5, 2023.

A VA claim is considered backlogged once it has been pending for more than 125 days. Since President Trump was inaugurated Jan. 20, the backlog has dropped from 264,717 to 198,378, a 25% reduction.

The backlog reduction VA announced today was made possible through a series of recordbreaking production milestones, including:

- Processing <u>a million disability claims</u> during a fiscal year faster than ever before.
- The highest monthly production rate in VA history in April, with 256,178 claims processed.
- The highest daily production rate in VA history May 20, with over 15,000 claims processed.

## **Backlog Background Info**

- The Biden Administration oversaw a 24% increase in the backlog, from 213,189 on Jan. 20, 2021, to 264,717 on Jan. 20, 2025.
- VA's backlog reached its highest point ever of 611,000 in March of 2013.
- VA achieved its lowest backlog ever of 64,738 in December of 2019.

# POW/MIA

Army Master Sgt. Donald P. Gervais, 24, killed during the Vietnam War, was accounted for May 16, 2025. In the spring of 1968, Gervais was assigned to Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 9th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division. On May 1, he was the door gunner on an OH-6A Cayuse helicopter on a reconnaissance mission over the A Shau Valley, Republic of Vietnam. A nearby aircraft reportedly witnessed the helicopter hit a dead tree and crash into a ravine. Due to enemy ground fire and dense vegetation over the rough terrain, the aircraft was unable to conduct a visual reconnaissance of the crash site. A nearby infantry platoon attempted to investigate the area but were forced to withdraw when they encountered enemy fire. On July 25, 1978, the U.S. Army changed Gervais' status from Missing in Action to Killed in Action and posthumously promoted him to the rank of Master Sgt.

Army Pfc. William E. Kutnock, 20, missing in action during World War II, was accounted for May 16, 2025. In 1943, Kutnock was assigned to Company D, 4th Ranger Battalion, "Darby's Rangers." He was killed on Sept. 19 during Operation AVALANCHE, the amphibious invasion of Italy, after his unit encountered enemy fire on an overnight reconnaissance mission on the Maiori-Pagani Road toward the village of Sala in the commune of Corbara. After the firefight, his unit conducted a thorough inspection of the battlefield but could not locate his remains. The War Department issued a finding of death for Kutnock on Dec. 1, 1944.

Army Technician Fifth Grade Daniel Wyatt, 39, killed during World War II, was accounted for May 7, 2025. In the summer of 1944, Wyatt was assigned to Company E, 364th Engineer General Service Regiment, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. On July 7, he was one of eight service members killed in the Crisbecq Battery complex near Saint-Marcouf in Normandy, France, by an explosion that partially caved in the concrete roof of a captured enemy bunker that they were clearing.

Army Staff Sgt. Junior J. Shelton, 24, killed during World War II, was accounted for April 25, 2025. In 1944, Shelton was assigned to Company B, 1st Battalion, 115th Infantry Regiment, 29th Infantry Division. He was reportedly killed in action on Oct. 4 after his company encountered German enemy forces near Hatterath, Germany. His remains were not accounted for after the war.

Army Pfc. Rodger E. Fields, 20, killed during the Korean War, was accounted for May 15, 2025. In December 1950, Fields was assigned to Company D, 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 7th Infantry Division. He was reported killed in action on Dec. 1, during the Battle of Jangjin (Chosin) Reservoir.

*Navy Capt. Thomas E. Scheurich*, 34, killed during the Vietnam War, was accounted for April 23, 2025. In March 1968, Scheurich was assigned to Attack Squadron THREE FIVE, Air Wing 9, USS Enterprise, Task Force 77, 7th Fleet. On March 1, he was piloting an A-6A Intruder aircraft with one other crew member, conducting a night strike mission over northern Vietnam. The last radio and radar contact with the aircraft was near the Gulf of Tonkin, over a series of islands known to have light anti-aircraft artillery. An air search failed to locate the aircraft and both crewmembers were declared missing in action. On April 28, 1978, the Navy reported Scheurich as Killed in Action. He was later posthumously promoted to the rank of Captain.



Army Pfc. Charles N. Milam, 20, missing in action during World War II, was accounted for May 8, 2025. In January 1944, Milam was assigned to Company F, 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division. From late January through late May 1944, the 3rd Infantry Division fought in the Battle of Anzio in Italy. On January 31, Milam was reported missing during combat against German forces near the small hamlet of Ponte Rotto, close to the town of Cisterna di Latina (Cisterna). Members of his squad believed that he may have been killed in action by artillery at some point that day, but his body was not recovered. Having no evidence that Milam had survived the conflict, the War Department issued a presumptive finding of death on April 19, 1945.

Navy Storekeeper 3rd Class Robert S. Garcia, 23, killed during World War II, was accounted for on April 14, 2025. On Dec. 7, 1941, Garcia was assigned to the battleship USS California, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft. The USS California sustained multiple torpedo and bomb hits, which caused it catch fire and slowly flood. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of approximately 102 crew members, including Garcia.

## Live Whole Health #274: Jam-packed with fiber May 28th, 2025 | Allison Hyzy, RD, LDN

Today we're digging into chia. And yes, we're talking about the same seeds that many of us grew on animal and character themed pots in the 1980s. Our past selves may be surprised by all of its culinary applications today, but we were missing out on chia's jam packed nutrition.

Chia seeds are a good source of fiber and contain omega 3-s (healthy fat), calcium and iron. Getting adequate fiber daily is a challenge for many Americans. In general, we are recommended to aim for about 25-38 grams per day (depending on age and gender). Fiber aids in satiety (feeling full after eating). It can help promote blood sugar and cholesterol control, and it helps with adding bulk to stool. A two-tablespoon serving of chia seeds contains 4 grams of protein, so not quite as much as an egg.

*Make a pudding or a jam (or a pet!).* What can we do with it other than growing green animals? My favorite ways are using chia as thickener to make chia pudding and chia jam. Chia pudding can be as simple as mixing 2 tablespoons of chia seeds and 1 teaspoon of sweetener with 4 ounces of your desired liquid (cow's milk, plant-based milk, milk blended with frozen fruit, etc.), covering it and allowing it to sit overnight in the refrigerator. Don't be fooled by their small size; to fully hydrate they require quite a bit of liquid. If you're looking to boost the fiber and omega -3s into your morning smoothie, add in 1-2 tablespoons and blend. They can also easily be added to pancake, muffin, quick bread and homemade granola recipes.

### Mixed Berry Chia Jam

#### Ingredients

- 3 cups mixed berries (fresh or frozen)
- 1/4 cup honey or maple syrup
- 1/4 cup organic chia seeds
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract (optional)
- 1/4 tsp cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp cardamom

Directions

- 1. Combine berries and honey in a small saucepan.
- 2. Cook over medium heat until berries begin to soften and burst, or about 5 minutes.
- 3. Add chia seeds and cook until very thick, or for about 15 minutes. Stir often.
- 4. Remove from heat and let cool; then add vanilla extract.5. Add cinnamon and/or cardamom.

#### Action Corps Weekly – May 26, 2025

Take Action to Say NO to Putting Veterans in Debt: Make your voices heard by taking action TODAY. Veterans should never go into debt to access their earned benefits! The VFW has repeatedly expressed concerns about charging veterans for initial claims assistance based on their future benefits, and thus, we strongly oppose <u>H.R. 3132</u>, CHOICE for Veterans Act of 2025, as written. This would potentially put veterans into debt even before utilizing their benefits. <u>Tell your representatives</u> to vote NO when this bill is brought to the House floor for a vote.

*VFW Speaks at Star Act Press Conference:* The VFW stood alongside partner Veterans Service Organizations, supporters, and advocates to urge for swift passage of VFW-championed <u>H.R.2102/S.1032</u>, Major Richard Star Act. America's veterans have served and sacrificed for this country, and the VFW is calling upon Congress to pass this commonsense bill to finally take care of medically retired veterans who were wounded in service. Former VFW National Legislative Director Pat Murray spoke at the press conference and stated, "Nearly three-quarters of Congress in both chambers, and on both sides of the aisle, support the Star Act. It certainly doesn't lack support for cosponsors. What it does lack, though, are votes for the bill." It is time for Congress to bring the Major Richard Star Act to the floor for a vote. <u>Watch the press conference</u>.

*VFW Meets with Committee Leadership: VFW Washington Office Executive Director Ryan Gallucci and National Legislative Director Kristina Keenan had meetings with Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs Ranking Member Richard Blumenthal and House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Ranking Member Richard Blumenthal and House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Ranking Member Mark Takano to discuss the VFW's legislative priorities and our call to <u>Honor the Contract</u> to ensure that veterans receive the benefits they have earned and deserve as promised in military service contracts. Additionally, they discussed the need to improve VA's Foreign Medical Program and urged support for <u>H.R. 467</u>, Foreign Medical Program Modernization Act of 2025. They also expressed disappointment that <u>H.R. 3132</u>, CHOICE for Veterans Act of 2025, was passed out of the House committee. This legislation would benefit predatory, unaccredited claims consultants that the VFW calls Claim Sharks, and risks putting veterans into debt. Both ranking members committed to cracking down on these bad actors and discussed other potential federal solutions.* 

*VFW Provides Statement for Senate Hearing: VFW National Legislative Director Kristina Keenan provided a statement for the record for a Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs pending legislation hearing. She provided input on proposals that include improvements to VA health care, research on brain injuries caused by low-level blast exposure, grants for transportation to medical appointments for rural veterans, enhanced access to service dogs, and expanded education benefits. One of the VFW's top legislative priorities covered in the hearing, <u>S. 649</u>, Guard and Reserve GI Bill Parity Act of 2025, would allow reserve component service members to earn GI Bill benefits for every day served, including annual training, drill weekends, and short activations for natural disasters and border security operations. <u>Read the testimony</u>.* 

*House Passes Nine Veteran Bills:* The House passed nine bipartisan bills for veterans and their families. The VFW recently provided written testimony in support of <u>H.R. 1286</u>, Simplifying Forms for Veterans Claims Act, that would improve VA forms sent to veterans regarding their claims for benefits; <u>H.R. 1578</u>, Veterans Claims Education Act of 2025, that would inform and provide resources to veterans who file VA disability claims on how to seek free, accredited representation, and how to report unaccredited representatives who charge unauthorized fees for their services; and <u>H.R. 2201</u>, Improving VA Training for Military Sexual Trauma Claims Act, that would provide annual sensitivity training to VA employees who process disability claims for conditions related to military sexual trauma. <u>Read more</u>.

# DAV CHAPTER 118

*DAV strongly opposes H.R. 3132, the CHOICE for Veterans Act (Certified Help Options in Claims Expertise for Veterans Act).* This bill would allow attorneys and agents to charge ill and injured veterans fees of up to \$12,500 or the amount equal to five times the monthly benefits increase, whichever is less, and if the claim results are favorable.

Currently, veterans can choose accredited veterans service organizations, agents and attorneys who provide free claims assistance. These experts ensure veterans receive knowledgeable representation without sacrificing any of their earned benefits.

H.R. 3132 weakens accreditation requirements, letting individuals assist veterans before meeting full qualification standards. This change risks unqualified representatives making costly mistakes and causing delays in securing benefits.

Although the bill includes some consumer protection measures, it lacks meaningful enforcement against deceptive practices or conflicts of interest and fails to stop unethical referrals to private medical professionals with financial ties to attorneys or agents.

Based on DAV resolution No. 324, we strongly oppose this legislation. Please contact your Representative and urge them to vote "No" on H.R. 3132 – and put the needs of ill and injured veterans and their families over the profits of predatory claims companies



# Summer Safety

A compilation of stuff to remind you about safety as the temperature gets much higher

#### **Prepare for Extreme Heat:**


- Learn to recognize the signs of heat illness.
- Do not rely on a fan as your primary cooling device. Fans create air flow and a false sense of comfort, but do not reduce body temperature or prevent heat-related illnesses.
- Identify places in your community where you can go to get cool such as libraries and shopping malls or contact your local health department to find cooling options in your area.
- Cover windows with drapes or shades.
- Weather-strip doors and windows.
- Use window reflectors specifically designed to reflect heat back outside.
- Add insulation to keep the heat out.
- Use a powered attic ventilator, or attic fan, to regulate the heat level of a building's attic by clearing out hot air.
- Install window air conditioners and insulate around them.
- If you are unable to afford your cooling costs, weatherization or energy-related home repairs, contact the <u>Low Income</u> <u>Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)</u> for help.

**FIREWORK, GRILLING SAFETY.** Fire department officials warned people against the use of fireworks, recommending attending a public firework show where the fireworks are handled by professionals. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, an estimated 10,200 people are injured by fireworks annually.

In addition, fire department officials offered the following grilling safety tips:

- Only use grills outdoors
- Place grills away from the home and other structures
- Place grills on a flat, level surface
- Check grills for leaks
- Clean grills after use
- Never leave a grill unattended
- Wear appropriate clothing when grilling
- Keep a spray bottle on hand (for fat drips)
- Always have a fire extinguisher close by

## **D-DAY – JUNE 6<sup>TH</sup>, 1944**

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE



Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen of the Allied Expeditionary Force!

You are about to embark upon the Great Crusade, toward which we have striven these many months. The eyes of the world are upon you. The hopes and prayers of libertyloving people everywhere march with you. In company with our brave Allies and brothers-in-arms on other Fronts, you will bring about the destruction of the German war machine, the elimination of Nazi tyranny over the oppressed peoples of Europe, and security for ourselves in a free world.

Your task will not be an easy one. Your enemy is well trained, well equipped and battle-hardened. He will fight savagely.

But this is the year 1944! Much has happened since the Nazi triumphs of 1940-41. The United Nations have inflicted upon the Germans great defeats, in open battle, man-to-man. Our air offensive has seriously reduced their strength in the air and their capacity to wage war on the ground. Our Home Fronts have given us an overwhelming superiority in weapons and munitions of war, and placed at our disposal great reserves of trained fighting men. The tide has turned! The free men of the world are marching together to Victory !

I have full confidence in your courage, devotion to duty and skill in battle. We will accept nothing less than full Victory !

Good Luck! And let us all beseech the blessing of Almighty God upon this great and noble undertaking.

"On June 6, 1944, more than 160,000 Allied troops landed along a 50-mile stretch of heavily fortified French coastline, to fight Nazi Germany on the beaches of Normandy, France. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower called the operation a crusade in which, "we will accept nothing less than full victory." More than 5,000 Ships and 13,000 aircraft supported the D-Day invasion, and by day's end, the Allies gained a foothold in Continental Europe. The cost in lives on D-Day was high. More than 9,000 Allied Soldiers were killed or wounded, but their sacrifice allowed more than 100,000 Soldiers to begin the slow, hard slog across Europe, to defeat Adolf Hitler's crack troops."

# BATTLE OF MIDWAY

#### U.S. Involvement in World War II



World War II began on September 1, 1939, when Nazi Germany invaded Poland. The U.S. remained neutral until December 7, 1941, when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. The Japanese employed six carriers to destroy the U.S. Pacific Fleet at Pearl Harbor; however, none of the U.S. carriers were present at Pearl Harbor during the assault.

The U.S. declared war against Japan on December 8, 1941. After several months of expansion, the Japanese Combined Fleet turned its sights on Midway, a small Pacific-based atoll, which then served as a U.S. sentry to Hawaii, refueling station, and landing point. The Japanese plan assumed the



Pacific Fleet would arrive too late to defend Midway, but U.S. forces were waiting for them at "Point Luck."

The victory at Midway represents a strategic turning point for the U.S. in Japan's war in the Pacific. Before the battle, Japan possessed naval superiority over the U.S. Afterward, opposing fleets were balanced and the U.S. soon took the offensive.

As a result of the battle on June 4th, the Japanese carriers Akagi, Kaga, and Soryu were hit and sank. The Japanese carrier Hiryu escaped the initial attack, but U.S. dive

bombers found, bombed, and sank her.

Midway was a great success in U.S. Navy history. The only strategic regret might have been failing to locate and attack Hiryu before its aircraft struck Yorktown.




#### Victory at Midway: Impact on World War II



The Battle of Midway marked a technical revolution in displacing gunnery with naval carrier airpower as a primary means of delivering ordnance.

Prior to the Battle of Midway, the Japanese conquered several territories and expanded their resources in the Far East and South Pacific. By early May, the Japanese had an extensive defensive perimeter.



## **RESULTS OF THE VICTORY AT MIDWAY**

- Japanese expansion halted, securing a central-Pacific guard post for Allied forces.
- Japanese losses at Midway made it possible for America's Navy to eventually reclaim maritime superiority in the Pacific theater.
- Naval Aviation proved to be a viable and necessary capability to win wars.
- Our Sailors' strength and resilience at Midway were a perfect illustration of the fighting spirit of America's Navy today.


